

Dress Code

- Clothing has never been a big issue at our homeschool group, but recently it has been brought to my attention. Some of you may be completely oblivious of what other children besides your own are wearing to classes; others, I have found out, are acutely aware. These following general rules should address these issues.
- Above all, be thoughtful of others in the room: dressing inappropriately often serves as a distraction to others.
- Clothes should be modest.
- There should be no shirts with offensive or distracting logos, messages or pictures.
- Students should dress to study. The way students dress will affect their attitude toward their academic work in class. Also, since the pastor of the church will be on campus, I feel it doubly important that the children look as if they are at the church to study and not to play. Students should then try to be a little more formal than they would when playing outside or just "hanging out."
- Here are just a few examples of appropriate dress: button-down shirts or polos for boys and female equivalent for girls; dress pants, khakis, jeans, corduroys for boys; skirts, dresses, jeans, khakis, or culottes for girls.
- Here are a few examples of inappropriate dress: ripped jeans, athletic clothing, "swishy" shorts or pants, oversized pants, drooping pants, flip-flops, spaghetti strap halter-tops, muscle shirts, "short shorts."
